AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN OF THE CITY OF DODGEVILLE, WISCONSIN

The Common Council of the City of Dodgeville, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

SECTION I.

Pursuant to sections 62.23(2) and (3) of the Wisconsin Statutes, the City of Dodgeville is authorized to prepare and adopt a comprehensive plan as defined in sections 66.1001(1)(a) and 66.1001(2) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

SECTION II.

The Common Council of the City of Dodgeville, Wisconsin, has adopted written procedures designed to foster public participation in every stage of the preparation of a comprehensive plan as required by section 66.1001(4)(a) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

SECTION III.

The Plan Commission of the City of Dodgeville by a majority vote of the entire commission recorded in its official minutes, has adopted a resolution recommending to the Common Council the adoption of the document entitled "COMPREHENSIVE PLAN OF THE CITY OF DODGEVILLE," containing all of the elements specified in Section 66.1001(2) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

SECTION IV.

The City of Dodgeville has held at least one public hearing on this ordinance, in compliance with the requirements of section 66.1001(4)(d) of the Wisconsin Statutes.


SECTION V.

The Common Council of the City of Dodgeville, Wisconsin, does, by the enactment of this ordinance, formally adopt the document entitled, "COMPREHENSIVE PLAN OF THE CITY OF DODGEVILLE," pursuant to section 66.1001 (4) (c) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

SECTION VI.

This ordinance shall take effect upon passage by a majority vote of the members-elect of the Common Council and publication as required by law.
